## Attendance

Please make sure that your child has good attendance at nursery and let us know if they will not be coming. Good attendance can help your child to:

- ✓ Build good habits for school and further studies
- ✓ Play, learn and have fun
- ✓ Develop in all areas of learning



### *Being on Time*

Being on time is also really important as it helps your child to settle into their nursery day more quickly. It can be more difficult for children who arrive late to 'catch up' with their friends games and to join in. It is also disruptive to other children's learning to have people 'coming and going' when they drop off late.

In the morning our drop off times are 8.45-9.15 and in the afternoon 12.45-1.15. Please try not to arrive outside of these times, however we understand that being late may be unavoidable now and again and we would much rather you came along than not at all!

### *30 Hours Children*

It is really important that children attend their session and group time with their 'primary key person' (Claire-Louise, Joanne, Lucy, Sally or Steph). There has been an increase in some children being collected after lunch, causing them to miss out on their group-time with Joanne or Claire-Louise. Please try to avoid doing this, but speak to your child's key person if there are occasions where you need to do so.

Please make sure you register with your child's key person at the beginning of every session, even if they are out in the garden. It is vital, for safety reasons, that they are marked in the register.

## Outdoor Days



We will be restarting our outdoor days after half term, having been patiently waiting for the ground to recover following our nature garden's plentiful use last term! Due to an increase in numbers of children in the morning, they will go out in two halves, with one half being dropped off in the nature garden (the one through the wooden gate by our buggy park) with their key person and the other being collected from there. Please look out for the poster each week for more information and to find out which day we have chosen for outdoor day. We choose different days each week and ask that children come to nursery in wellies and long trousers that day.

## Bag Reminders
